GREETINGS,

"The Lord is near; have no anxiety, but in everything make your requests known to God in prayer and petition with thanksgiving." (Philippians 4:6)

Prior to reading these words at the National Prayer Breakfast, which I attended recently, in Ottawa, the Hon. Jack Layton paused to reflect how the power of prayer was so much a part of his life experience. After he shared the news of being diagnosed with prostate cancer with the nation, he became aware, through cards, letters and e-mails that he was being upheld in the prayers of Canadians all across the country. Members of Parliament arrived in the House of Commons one day, all wearing ties and scarves with the blue colour which has been claimed as the symbol of the fundraising campaign seeking to find a cure for this illness. He later shared with me how the visual image of that moment has been a source of strength in his ongoing battle with the disease.

Olympic multi - medal winner Cindy Klassen and her sister, Lisa, spoke to the almost 600 people who had journeyed from all across the country to attend the breakfast gathering. Theirs was a story of mutual support at times when Lisa's life hung in the balance after a car crash and when Cindy's knee surgeries raised questions about her future skating career. Each of them spoke with great eloquence about the reality of the power of prayer as they faced the unknown future in their own lives.

Looking into the future, with all of its possibilities, has been a key element in the recent life of our own Parish Family. Our "Stepping Out in Faith" conversations have given us the opportunity to listen well to each other and to seek God's guidance in the midst of a time of change. Our

recent Town Hall experience has clearly indicated that an ongoing pattern of personal and corporate prayer is needed as we continue our shared journey.

We will continue to gather more information about the physical status of our church buildings. We will continue to explore how we can best define the mission and ministry of our congregation in the heart of the City of Kitchener. We will continue to respond to the Baptismal Covenantal call "to seek and serve Christ in all persons", and, "respect the dignity of every human being". All that we say we will continue to do we can only accomplish through the commitment of the members of our Parish Family to a pattern of prayerful and practical support for the ministry of our congregation.

In addition to your regular attendance at worship, in addition to your regular almsgiving and financial support, my request is that you consider incorporating the following prayer into your own pattern of life.

Loving God, guide and direct the life of our Parish Family as we gather for worship and fellowship at the Church of St. John the Evangelist. Help us to listen well to the guidance of the Holy Spirit, that as we are nurtured and fed by your Holy Word and Sacraments, so we may be empowered to serve you through our words and actions each and every day of our lives. This we ask in the name of Jesus Christ, our Lord. Amen.

As the calendar year continues to unfold, let us, as a Parish Family, renew our personal commitment to our shared ministry and look to the future as we uphold each other in our prayers.

DIOCESAN NEWS

Our Diocesan Synod will be held in London on May 16, 17 and 18. One of the motions that our parish representatives will be considering on our behalf is a proposal to hold Synod every other year rather than every year. This is, of course, a proposal that results from a consideration of ways to cut down on expenses. On Sunday, May 30, our synod representatives will report back to us on the developments of their deliberations.

On Thursday, May 27, our own Eileen Scully and a former student, Katie Silcox, will be ordained priests in an ordination service at the cathedral in London. Please see the rector if you'd like more information about this event.

REDEVELOPMENT COMMITTEE

Our parish has accepted a contract to retain the services of Louis Reginato, a professional engineer who is well known to many members of St. John's. Mr. Reginato will coordinate a study of our building with respect to various possible redevelopment options, as well as a survey of any hazardous materials that are to be found anywhere within our building. He will also report on the probable cause of the deteriorating brickwork on the north face of our church and provide our insurance company with an estimate of the cost of repairs. Mr. Reginato has undertaken to complete this report within the next six months.

RENAISSANCE SINGERS

Beginning this month, the Renaissance Singers will rehearse at the Church of St. John the Evangelist. They will make use of our sanctuary every Tuesday evening for their practices. Thanks to Lynda Smith for arranging this new use of our space.

DIRECTORY NEWS

The photographs for our new parish directory have all been taken and the final copy has been sent in to the printer. Members of St. John's who have had their photographs taken will have received their personal copy either in the mail or personally delivered after Sunday service on May 16. If you haven't received your photos, or have questions about them, please see either Matt Kieswetter or Doug Woodley. All family groups or single members of St. John's who are listed separately in the directory will receive a free copy of this new directory. We anticipate that the new directories will be available for everyone before the end of July.



MEMORIAL GARDEN

On the advice of several experts, we regret that we have had to close off access to our Memorial Garden until repairs have been made to the brickwork on the north side of the church. The possibility of someone being injured by bits of falling masonry has made this temporary restriction necessary. We have asked our consulting engineer, Mr. Louis Reginato, to proceed as quickly as possible with discovering why the bricks above the garden are falling, and to tell us what measures we need to take to fix the problem. There is a possibility that these repairs might be covered by our insurance, and we are in touch with our insurance adjuster about this, but until we can be sure that the area is safe we must ask that everyone respect the request to stay out of the memorial garden.

A NEW TAX ON CHURCHES

On Thursday, May 13, Jennifer Uttley and Doug Woodley attended a meeting convened by the K-W Council of Churches to hear a presentation from a city engineer about a plan to pay for upgrades to the management of storm water with a new levy that would be imposed on all churches, faith communities, schools and public institutions on a monthly basis. This would result in an annual tax on our church of (to begin with) \$738.00 per year.

Over fifty churches and Faith communities were represented at this meeting, and, with one exception, everyone opposed the plan. The reasons for this opposition were many: this is a form of property tax, and once we're taxable for this, what is to stop the city from taxing us for other services as if we were a non-charitable property? Which of our currently funded social programmes will we have to cut to enable us to pay for this tax? The administrative costs of this new levy (estimated at close to 12% of the total revenue) are a new cost to the city and will very likely run much higher than the estimate. Why not use the existing tax base to meet this expense?

Jennifer and Doug moved that the K-W Council of Churches attend the May 17 City Finance Committee meeting at City hall and make a presentation of the churches' views. This motion was passed, and James Brown, the president of the Council of Churches undertook to do this. As of the printing of this issue of On Eagles' Wings, we have not learned of the results of the Finance Committee meeting, but we suggest that if you are as concerned as we are about this issue, it might be worthwhile getting in touch with your City Council Member and letting him or her know your thoughts on beginning to tax churches, schools and hospitals.

NEW FORMAT FOR ON EAGLES' WINGS

This will be the last edition of On Eagles' Wings that will be printed on paper for all our members. Our next edition will be published at the beginning of September, but it will come to you via our parish website. We will continue to print a couple of dozen copies of our newsletter for those who cannot access our website. These copies will either be delivered by volunteers to those who are unable to attend church or available on the narthex table for those unable to access the website on the computer. This will save us a great deal of expense both of paper and printing costs as well as the time and effort of volunteers. And speaking of our volunteers, we are most grateful for the work of assembling and delivering On Eagles' Wings to everyone's mailbox which has been done over many years by Ralph and Hazel Nobes as well



as many other volunteers. We are also especially grateful to Marie Peacock, an editor of this newsletter for the past seven years, who will step back to a well-deserved retirement. Marie and I have enjoyed working together, and although I'll miss her as a lively and wonderfully efficient partner, I'm sure that she deserves a well-earned rest from newsletter duties, and I'm happy that she'll have more time for her many other interests. I am also grateful for Paul Millerd who has volunteered to work with all of us here at St. John's to begin formatting our news items and posting them, with the assistance of our webmaster, Brian Smith, onto our website.

On May 15th over thirty Ladies from the Deanery, including two visitors from other congregations, met in the Lower Parish Hall. Our first guest speaker was Gail Domagala, the past president of the A.C.W. Huron Diocesan Council. She told us how she began eight years ago as a Deanery Representative. She likened the work of the A.C.W. to riding a Tandem bicycle, Christ is on the front showing us the way and we are pedaling on the back as we work to put His wishes into practice. Of course when we tire, He often gets on the back and does the pedaling for us.

Our second speaker for the morning was Thea Parker, who spoke to us about Kazuri jewellery -small and beautiful- which she offered for sale in support of the Omas Siskona chapter of Waterloo. She explained how the jewellery is made by women in Kenya and how the profits are distributed through the Stephen Lewis Foundation to help women in sub-Saharan Africa, especially those who are taking care of their own grandchildren and other orphans of the A.I.D.S. pandemic. Thea was helped by her daughter Anne, and her granddaughter Nancy looked after the V.C.R.

The Rev: Grace Schaefer acted as chaplain for the morning and delighted everyone with her humour. The morning ended with a delicious lunch served by our Catering Team.

Confirmation

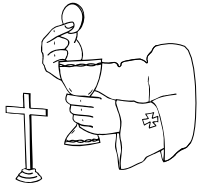
One of the Sacraments of the church is the Sacrament of Confirmation. Many times I have been asked just what Confirmation is all about. For many of us, when we were a baby our parents and sponsors presented us to the Church at a baptismal service. They wanted to share with us the gift of the Christian faith. As we grew older we learned many more things about what it really meant about being a Christian. As we matured, there came a time for us to stand on our own; to speak for ourselves and say YES to God. We took on the promises our parents and sponsors made for us at our baptism and became an adult member of the church. Last fall I had the wonderful privilege and blessing to journey with a number of our people as they explored what it meant to take on the baptismal promises for themselves.

In November 2010, there will be a Deanery Confirmation service at St John's Anglican in Cambridge (Preston). I would like to extend an invitation to those who have wondered about Confirmation either for young person or themselves to speak with me as I will be offering classes this fall.

Life in the Eucharist – A Communion Program for Children

Just as Confirmation is one of the Sacraments, Eucharist is one of the major Sacraments of the Church and is a spiritual journey. The Life in the Eucharist program is designed to help parents and child share their faith with one another and facilitates growth in the parish. It is not the children alone who are being nurtured, but the





children and their families and in turn their church family. The Life in the Eucharist program is not just for children who are preparing for their first communion, it is an ideal program for enhancing the

Eucharistic understanding of all 7 – 9 year olds.

Prayer Shawl Ministry Gathering &

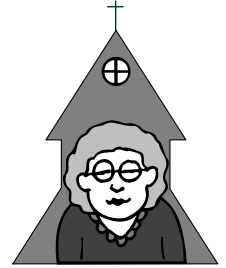

Thanks to our own ACW, along with other Deanery guests and friends, we were able to have a sale of Kazuri jewelry on Saturday May 15th. Because of their work in producing these unique African pieces, disadvantaged women in Kenya are better able to take care for their families. All profits from this sale have been sent to the Stephen Lewis Foundation (SLF) and will go to help grandmothers in sub-Saharan Africa raising their own grandchildren and other children left in their care, who have been orphaned by AIDS.

While our work toward the much needed generic drugs for HIV/AIDS continues, our present focus is on children's education. On June the 15th, starting at Waterloo Park, we join with other grandmother groups from coast to coast in the National Walk to support free primary education for all children by 2015. *It was a millenium promise.*

Our next meeting will be June 16th at 7:30 pm at Christ Lutheran Church. The guest speaker will be Patsy George – a recipient of the Order of Canada and a SLF Board member.

RESULTS FROM ACW DEANERY MEETING

The total sales (including after church today) were \$3375, with \$1360 going to the Stephen Lewis Foundation. The \$2015 (not SLF) pays for the jewelry itself to Kazuri factory - giving those women the dignity and joy of earning their livelihood and supporting their families, - pays for the shipping to Canada, and the duties and taxes here. All labor on the Canadian end is volunteer - in this case two different Grandmother groups (the Kazuri Jewelry Grandmother Connection and Omas Siskona). Isn't that great!! Thanks to all those who came and supported this. We have been invited to bring this to next year's ACW Annual at the end of April and have already agreed and the local Omas Siskona is excited to do this. Ann and Thea.

Guest speaker Dr. Hind Al-Abadleh: Science + Faith = Earth Stewardship

If we'd been asked to plan an event encompassing motherhood, thanksgiving for the earth's abundance, stewardship of our natural environment and interfaith dialogue, any one of us in the St. John's Green Passion working group might have exclaimed; "impossible ... too much at once!"

But on May 9, the seemingly impossible happened with ease when guest speaker **Dr. Hind Al-Abadleh** and her family joined us for 10 a.m. Matins.

Not only were we marking the international celebration of Mother's Day; it was also the traditional Anglican observance of Rogation Sunday (the blessing of newly-planted crops and prayers for good weather), our chosen observance of Earth Day within this parish, and the first occasion in recent memory when the homily was presented by a member of our sister faith of Islam. Amazingly, she covered these vast but related subject areas with wisdom, conviction and grace.

As a professor of environmental chemistry at Wilfrid Laurier University, Dr. Al-Abadleh deals on a daily basis with the accumulated physical effects of human influence (both positive and negative) on our planet's atmosphere, water systems and land-masses.

Sadly, it's the negative evidence that continually reminds us what a huge price we've paid for our material wealth and high-consumption lifestyles. Even as she spoke, crude oil continued to gush into the Gulf of Mexico from a sunken deep-sea drilling platform whose poorly regulated pollution "safeguards" had failed miserably. And we know that this won't be the last such incident.

In the face of steadily worsening news about climate change, oil spills and shrinking resources, one can feel overwhelmed and powerless, but Dr. Al-Abadleh's vision is about connecting faith and facts to make positive change – and you don't have to be a professional scientist to do it.

Inspired by both environmentalist Dr. David Suzuki and numerous references to stewardship found in the Qur'an (Islam's holy scripture), she has devoted much of her life to showing how science and religion can work together at the grassroots level for the healing and preservation of Earth's endangered environment.

The Qur'an, she noted, repeatedly points out that we are not masters of creation; we were not given a divine entitlement to subdue, exploit, or consume at will everything the earth provides. Rather, we humans are God's stewards, collectively responsible for maintaining ecological balance in the created world.

Everything around us is a sign of God's ongoing creative presence, to which we respond by giving thanks and consuming in moderation. But when we ignore that core principle by greedily seeking excess rather than sufficiency, creation is thrown out of balance, along with our relationship to God. Using different images and contexts, Judaism, Christianity and other world faiths also express the vital importance of good stewardship.

Dr. Al-Abadleh pointed out that the Qur'an is especially forthright in teaching humans how to act on their natural feelings of awe and wonder in the face of natural phenomena and the sheer beauty of our

planet. We must "see" these myriad signs of God's presence with more than physical eyes; we must also follow through in acts of faith, with an attitude of respect and reverence for all living things and the seemingly inanimate materials that sustain life.

And in this, as God told the Prophet Muhammad (peace be upon him) lies true righteousness for all the "children of Adam."

We were privileged to have Dr. Al-Abadleh stay after worship for a question-and answer session, during which she shared many specific examples of how her work affects, and is affected by, current environmental issues. And it was surprising how many of our members drew from their own scientific backgrounds to exchange insights, experiences and concerns with our guest.
